University of Rochester was well represented at the Council of Residency Directors (CORD) Academic Assembly in New Orleans in March 2024.



Monitoring and mitigation of neurological injuries to optimize resilience after repetitive head impacts (MONITOR RHI)



Jeffrey Bazarian '02M (MPH), '87M (MD), '90M (Res) has secured a grant for a \$5M project, "Monitoring and Mitigation of Neurological Injuries to Optimize Resilience After Repetitive Head Impacts (MONITOR RHI)."

There currently exists no effective method for monitoring brain health in athletes and military personnel exposed to repetitive head impacts (RHIs). Multiple studies have indicated that RHIs may be linked to long-term deterioration in brain health such as cognitive dysfunction, depression, and chronic traumatic encephalopathy (CTE).

The overall goals of this project are to identify repetitive head impacts that impair neurologic functioning, and to test treatments that can mitigate these effects and return functioning to normal as quickly as possible.

This endeavor will involve four individual but complementary research projects to address these goals. These projects reflect the strategic integration of several

research groups that have been working in parallel to develop practical methods for brain injury detection and treatment.
