#### PATIENT CARE

Moving forward from Cockcroft-Gault creatinine clearance to race-free estimated glomerular filtration rate to improve medication-related decision-making in adults across healthcare settings: A consensus of the National Kidney Foundation Workgroup for Implementation of Race-Free eGFR-Based Medication-Related Decisions

The authors of this article published in AJHP in November advocate for using race-free estimated glomerular filtration rate (eGFR) over Cockcroft-Gault (C-G) estimated creatinine clearance in adults with stable kidney function to enhance medication related decisions. It highlights limitations of relying on C-G eCrCL for medication dosing including the increase in average body weight of the US population, variation in body weight parameters used to calculate, and the equation being developed with data from primarily white males. The National Kidney Foundation, the American Society of Nephrology, and 2024 KDIGO Guidelines recommend adjusting standardized eGFR using patient's BSA for improved dosing decisions.
